It's a RAP – Launch of the Reconciliation Action Plan (Stretch) June 2024-2027

The Nature Parks launched the *Reconciliation Action Plan (Stretch) June 2024-2027* at an intimate event on 25 September at the Koala Conservation Reserve.

The cover of the RAP features a beautiful artwork by Bunurong artist Kobi Sainty called 'Natures Connection', testimonials from key stakeholders and partners, staff profiles, case studies and most importantly the deliverables under three pillars of respect, relationships and opportunities which will drive the reconciliation actions we take as an organisation over the next three years.

This Reconciliation Action Plan provides the Nature Parks, as land managers, the

opportunity to deepen our understanding of Country through meaningful relationships, enable Bunurong to drive outcomes for Country through shared responsibility, and drive positive social change by supporting our team to be truth tellers and allies for selfdetermination, voice, and treaty.

Walungurru School visit

Students from Walungurru School visited Phillip Island (Millowl) for the second time as part of their annual school excursion and once again loved their time here. The school is 650 km from Alice Springs on the NT/WA border and for some of the students, it was their first ever visit to the ocean. They loved seeing all the birds, especially the little penguins. Providing free entry to groups like this is a commitment in our RAP and one way we can support First Nations people to have unique experiences on Bunurong Country.

Lost at Sea Project

The Lost at Sea Project is a partnership between Phillip Island Nature Parks, Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation (BLCAC), and Monash University that aims to study and preserve cultural heritage values on Seal Rocks and protect the fur seal colony.

The BLCAC have identified Seal Rocks as a culturally significant site to Traditional Owners and with their invaluable knowledge and deep connection to the land, we hope to capture critical information before it is lost forever. Rising sea levels and increasing erosion compels an urgent Cultural Heritage Assessment to be undertaken. It is critical to have the knowledge and expertise of Bunurong in the process. This project will mark the first stage of a three-year effort to document and protect these cultural and environmental treasures and the project is supported by funding from Telematics Trust and the Penguin Foundation.
